- Currently or who have recently worked (within the last 5 years) in community settings i.e. general practice,
   community pharmacy, CMHTs, PCNs, nursing homes, district nursing, substance misuse services in the UK

### Patients/carers

- Aged 18 and over
- Live in the UK
- Patients who have been diagnosed with a mental illness, regularly take prescribed medication and access
   NHS community services e.g. general practices OR a person who cares for someone who does

# What will the study involve?

- Attending one 2.5 hour online workshop taking place via Zoom
- You will be asked to identify, discuss and agree ranking of priority areas for ways to improve medication safety for patients with mental illness in primary care
- Discussions will be guided by previous research which has examined what factors contribute to medication safety concerns for patients with mental illness in primary care
